2.3.2 - Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The word "mentor" is defined as "An experienced and trusted adviser to advice or train". In medical education, a mentor plays many roles, including supervisor, teacher, or a coach. Mentoring differs from teaching in that it involves developing a relationship that focuses on achieving specific goals. A mentor is employed to counsel and teach a less experienced student or colleague. The aim is to guide juniors to achieve a wide array of objectives, such as attainment of a practical skill, personal and professional development, research opportunity, and academic development. Mentors also provide emotional support and counselling, as well as professional help. Five key elements to mentoring include: 1. Should help the mentee to achieve short- and long-term goals. 2. Should include role modelling, and help with career development. 3. Both mentee and mentor should benefit from the relationship. 4. Relationships should involve direct interaction between mentor and mentee. 5. Mentors should be more experienced when compared with the mentee. The purpose of mentoring is to provide a nurturing relationship, where a more experienced person serves as a role model, teacher, and counsellor to the mentee. The goal of mentoring is to enhance the professional development of the mentee through the direct transfer of knowledge and experience. Mentoring relationships are usually bidirectional, as both parties can benefit from professional development. Professional development can lead to more efficient and effective workers, as well as opportunity for individual introspection, self-reflection and self-renewal. Mentors should have certain key character traits necessary for successful mentor-mentee relationships; display admirable qualities, be honest and trustworthy, be altruistic, be approachable, and have professional experience. Mentees should take the responsibility to seek out the mentor. Mentees should be respectful of the mentor's time and input. An effective mentee is able to make the most out of their time with their mentors by being prepared before sessions: come to the session with a structured plan, list of discussion points, timelines, and questions. During the session, the mentee should actively listen to the advice given by the mentors and be open to the criticism or feedback given by the mentor. In our university, this program is running, however, during the last couple of months it has been a bit dormant because of COVID, however, with the decline in the number of cases now again our Cell has been activated and the program is restarted.

Our university has established systems and processes for maintaining various physical and academic support facilities like - Laboratory, Library, Sports Facilities, Computers, Classrooms, etc. For Purchase and Management, a Central purchase committee is constituted by the Vice Chancellor to procure different materials and items, including maintenance and improvement of University Campus. This committee constitutes following members: CMS MS Registrar FO Technical expert for concerned items Head of the department/in charge of indenting department 2 Professors of clinical para clinical departments (nominated as domain in-charges of various domains, e.g. Linen, Furnitures, Stationary, IT, Medical equipment, Medicine Surgical, Administrative block, COE, Research cell Maintenance cell) a) Purchase: For procurement purpose the concerned domain in-charge asks for demand with justification (for a year/3 months) from all heads or incharges, etc. The requirements are raised from the concerned departments like - a) Pathology and Microbiology, for their Laboratories b) Central Librarian Library Advisory Committee, for all Library materials c) Athletic Association, for sport facilities d) IT cell, for computers, etc. Specification of required items are provided by the demanding department. Domain in-charge may modify them, as necessary to rationalize the process/requirement and compile for purchase (may discuss with demanding department or take external technical advice). The Central Purchase committee approves specifications, quantity, mode of procurement and budget allocation as per Government financial rules and University Acts Statutes. The concerned domain incharge processes and raises the purchase order after approval from the competent authorities. Specifications are checked for their availability on Gem portal for the specific product. Purchase is being done through budget (allocated by the government) or private fund (approved by FO and Vice Chancellor). As per requirement of the specifications, Gem bid is performed. For value of - a) < 25,000 Rs. Direct purchase is done b) 25,000 - 5 lac Rs. Comparative bid is done c) >5 lacs, E-bid is done for purchase. But if the requirements are not available on Gem portal, Customize bid is done (after notification in press on college website). Then technical opening of the bid is followed by technical evaluation. If it qualifies, financial bid is done and the lowest price is estimated, quoted approved. b) Maintenance: For this purpose, we have a "Civil, Electrical, Mechanical - repair and maintenance committee" constituting of 2 Faculties 2 Executive Engineers (from Nirman Vibhag and Electrical Mechanical Vibhag) who monitor various purchase, repair/maintenance of materials and goods. For maintenance work, tender requirement is raised by specific departments. JE of the concerned specialty (civil/electrical/mechanical) visits the site and draws an estimate/tender via same process, as above in purchase through Gem portal. After getting the concerned tenders, technical bid and financial bid is approved by the committee. On getting lowest bid, work and order (for execution) is placed and the work is executed. Then Junior engineer prepares Measure book for the payment to the party, which is further verified by Executive Engineer, the Department concerned and finally approved by FO, Registrar.

Students are empowered to play important role in different activities. Student representatives are chosen from every batch, including MBBS, BDS, Nursing, research/PG and paramedical courses (5 each) in a yearly fashion to represent various student issues. The centre conducts on regular basis Trauma Training Workshop, Basic Life Support Workshop(BLS), Biomedical Waste Management Workshop(BMW), Palliative Care Skills Workshop and Soft Skills Workshop 2. Biomedical waste Bio-Medical Waste Management: - An unique in house partially self-supporting system of at-source segregation, collection, transportation, treatment and disposal leading to revenue generation. Mercury phasing out, electronic waste disposal, sharps disposal by smelting, designing special trolleys/ bins matching our wards topography for at source waste segregation. Cardiac arrest and especially out of hospital Cardiac arrest is a lethal event contributing to significant human mortality. This dramatic and almost always fatal preterminal event can be managed in society by adequately training the population in the skill of basic life support. This skill if universally available to healthcare workers, as well as the general population, can sustain life in a patient of Cardiac arrest till the time advanced life care arrives and thus can be life-saving for many patients. KGMU has taken upon itself to train as many healthcare providers as well as representatives from the general population in the skill of basic life support and such training sessions are regularly held in the centre of advance skill development as well as other individual departments that conduct these courses at regular intervals. In the year 2019-20 more than 10 search courses were conducted in KGMU where theoretical teaching with practice sessions on mannequins, and demonstrations by experts were carried out to train the attendees in this very imperative skill of basic life support.
